






Reception

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



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Year 1

Year 1 have had an amazing start to the term. We have started our new learning journey in English of 'The Smeds and the Smoos' where the children had to sequence the story; do some role play and describe the different planets in the story. In Maths we have done some work counting in 5's and have started doing some work on money. In Science we have started our unit on plants. The children went outside and looked for different plants and then did a little experiment to see which bean will grow the best. Well done Year 1's you have worked super hard this week.









Year 2

Year 2 had a fantastic first week back after half term. The children have settled back into school routines brilliantly and enjoyed our school trip to Bluebell Woods on Wednesday afternoon. After reading a new book in English which was all about a badger who wanted the forest to be neat and tidy for its other inhabitants, the children used litter picking devices to collect rubbish found in the woods and put it in bin liners, so that we could dispose of it. 
















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


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Year 3


It has been a great start back for Year 3, as we head into the Summer term. In Maths, we have been learning the 4 times tables and the children have been brilliant in their desire to learn these and practice them in different ways. In English, we have started to learn about instruction writing and remembering some of the features that need to be included. In History we have started to learn about the Anglo-Saxon period and remembering our learning around the Roman period that preceded

it.



Year 4

This week Year 4 have started their new History topics - The Anglo-Saxons. They spent the afternoon researching why the Anglo-Saxons invaded Britain and where they came from. They explored the avenues of farming, new homes and the relationships between the Romans and the Anglo-Saxons. This has put us in good stead to look at their settlements in the coming weeks.









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Year 5

Year 5 have returned from the Easter holidays ready and raring to go. We have started looking at a new book in English and written a piece of dialogue based on the text. In RE we have started looking at the concept of wisdom and created a poster for a piece of wisdom.





Year 6

In Year 6 this week we are looking at how we can enhance our descriptive writing to include atmosphere in a setting. First we analysed some texts and discovered that all of our senses could be used to describe a setting. We then used a drama technique of 'freeze frame' to write some descriptive sentences of our own. Mrs Shepherd asked us to become something in the image, we had to freeze in position and then describe what we were. It was fun and we came up with some fantastic descriptive sentences. Here are some:

- 1) I am a wonderful, vibrant, enchanted flower that lives in the magical forest, feeding the golden little buzzy bees as they zoom around.
- 2) I am a luscious, verdant tree: I provide oxygen and homes for birds.
- 3) I am a colossal, beautiful, majestic castle, which towers above the forest, gleaming in the sun and seeing myself in the mirror-like river. Impressed? I was!! Mrs Shepherd.





Why high attendance is important for education

As a parent/carer you want the best for your children. Having a good education is an important factor in opening up more opportunities in adult life. Did you know that:

- a child who is absent a day of school per week misses an equivalent of two years of their school life
- 90% of young people with absence rates below 85% fail to achieve five or more good grades of GCSE and around one third achieve no GCSEs at all
- poor examination results limit young people's options and poor attendance suggests to colleges and employers that these students are unreliable

All absence at any stage leads to gaps in your child's learning. This in turn can:

- mean that they fall behind in work
- affect their motivation
- affect their enjoyment of learning
- lead to poor behaviour
- affect their ability to have or keep friendships.

Supporting your child's school attendance

Good school attendance habits are best started early. Children learn from those around them and you as parents/carers set the standards and expectations for your child.
